Dear Mr. Anderson:

On September 28, 1983, we met to discuss the above-captioned case at the fourth step of the contractual grievance occdure set forth in the National Agreement.

The question raised in this grievance involved entitlement to higher level pay for nonmachine clerks who cull mail.

After further review of this matter, we mutually agreed that no national interpretive issue is fairly presented in the particulars evidenced in this case. We agreed that culling mail in and of itself does not entitle employees to higher level pay. Whether the assignments which gave rise to this grievance entitled employees to higher level pay is not a national interpretive question.

Accordingly, as we further agreed, this case is hereby remanded to the parties at Step 3 for further processing, if necessary.

Dear Mr. Adams:

On October 12, 1982, we met to discuss the above-captioned grievance at the fourth step of our contractual grievance procedure.

The matters presented by you as well as the applicable contractual provisions have been reviewed and given careful consideration.

The question in this grievance is whether management violated Article XXV of the National Agreement by not compensating the grievant, a Level 3 Custodian, at a higher level for securing the building, locking the gates, and lowering the flag.

The is the position of the Postal Service that the duties described do not justify higher level compensation but are within the scope of difficulty assigned to Level 3 Custodial positions.

Accordingly, we find no contractual violation and the grievance is denied.
