Dear Mr. Wilson:

On October 9, 1981, we met with you to discuss the above-captioned grievance at the fourth step of our contractual grievance procedure.


The matters presented by you as well as the applicable contractual provisions have been reviewed and given careful consideration.

The question in this grievance is whether or not management violates Article I of the National Agreement by using alternating 204Bs when the regular supervisor is off. The Union contends that the workers never know who their supervisor is.

It is the position of the U. S. Postal Service that the assignment of alternating 204Bs is certainly no violation of Article I. However, we do acknowledge that employees should have some means of identifying their supervisor either by verbal or written instructions, or by some type of badge.

Accordingly, as we find no violation of Article I of the National Agreement, this grievance is denied.
